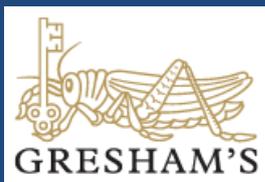
## INVENTING THE FUTURE

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## BIOLOGY

Enrichment activities in the Biology department have already started well this term. Amelia Doran (Q) and Will Shaw (F) have been appointed co-secretaries of the school's prestigious Hodgkin Society and gave the first presentations of the year at a meeting earlier this week. Will gave an overview of how biology and technology have been crucial in the modernisation of farming and Amelia provided an account of research carried out by the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine on dormancy in *Trypanosoma cruzi* infections. In addition, the department is in the process of setting up an exciting new project in fungal barcoding as part of the Saturday morning Academic Enrichment activities. This will be a long-term project in conjunction with former Gresham's Biology teacher Dr Tony Leech and the John Innes Centre to set up a DNA isolation lab at Gresham's. Using a range of molecular biology techniques, the group will eventually be able to extract DNA from fungal samples for sequencing and then classification.

## FRENCH


Helena Hunt spent time in France improving her language skills during the school holidays. Here is what she has to say about her visit:

*I spent part of my summer holiday staying with a French family living in Nice. Weekdays were spent at the local school, where all lessons were conducted in French with focus varying from day to day. While some focus was on grammar points and vocabulary, often activities were based on role-plays or speaking with the locals. Other students came from a variety of locations such as Belgium, Germany, Russia, Greece and Poland therefore all casual conversation had to be conducted in French as well which was instrumental in improving my conversational French skills in a short amount of time. Afternoon lessons were focused on speaking and listening skills and revolved primarily around debate, for example whether schoolteachers should be allowed to wear burkas at work - this was where having a class of diverse nationalities was so interesting, as each person had a different take on these kinds of issues. In the evenings, we spent time at the beach or playing volleyball before eating dinner back with our host families. Overall, it was a fantastic and slightly daunting experience which helped me to see the French language as it is really used and spoken in day-to-day life outside of the classroom, as well as fundamentally helping me improve my language skills whilst making friends along the way.*

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## SCIENCE GROUP 4 PROJECT

In September, Year 12 IB pupils took part in the Science 'Group 4' project. This involved all IB students from the different science subjects being placed into mixed groups to work together on a practical challenge.



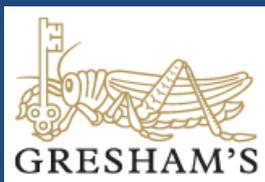
Pupils were given the theme of 'materials' and had just three hours to plan an investigation of their choosing to fit with this theme.

Once planned, students then carried out their experiments over the course of a whole day, collecting data and modifying their experiment depending on the results obtained. They then had to present their data in a suitable format and prepare a presentation to show their findings and this was held in Tig's at the end of the day.

There were some excellent projects, ranging from testing the strength of different tights, to assessing the flammability of fabrics and even to testing if the material a food is presented in alters how we perceive it's taste! All students really engaged with the project and worked together brilliantly and it was especially good to see new friendships being made. There were some excellent presentations, enjoyed by staff and students and well done to everybody involved. Also a huge thank you to the staff supporting the project, especially the laboratory technicians who worked hard to source and prepare all the equipment requested.

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## ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT LECTURES

### **Brexit – two contrasting views debated**

On Friday 7 September, pupils, parents, staff, and OGs from both the Senior and Prep schools joined Simon Kinder and Richard Peaver to reflect on what has happened so far and discuss what perhaps is to come. Mr Peaver, former Housemaster and French Teacher, first proposed arguments in support of the UK leaving the EU with a particular emphasis on the changing relationship between the two and the benefits of greater control of immigration and trade. Mr Kinder, Gresham's Head of History, then presented views against Brexit, focusing on a lack of direction since the triggering of Article 50. Following these points, the floor was opened up to a broad range of questions from audience members of all ages. Discussion continued on well after the end of the event, which was a model example of a civil and reasoned debate on an issue that has otherwise been associated with misinformation and confusion.



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## GARDEN CLUB

### Fishing and eel trap trip to Bayfield Estate

Although eel numbers have declined precipitously in recent decades, the Norfolk River Trust has had some success recording elvers moving into the River Glaven, and older eels into the river and associated ponds and lakes. The Norfolk River Trust is working on reconnecting back-waters and ponds in order to improve habitat for eels, by felling trees in flood-risk-free areas and implementing new eel passes to improve eel and fish passage upstream.



We checked the trap and after this photo was taken the eel slipped from the net and back to the wrong side of the sluice gate next to Bayfield Lake!

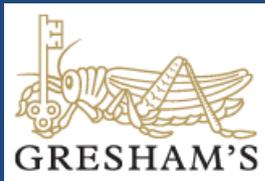
The European eel is a critically endangered species. Since the 1970s, the numbers of eels reaching Europe is thought to have declined by around 90%. Contributing factors include overfishing, parasites, barriers to migration such as hydroelectric dams, and natural changes in the North Atlantic oscillation, Gulf Stream, and North Atlantic drift.

The ancient city of Ely occupies the largest island in the Cambridgeshire Fens. The "Isle of Ely" is so called because it was only accessible by boat until the water-logged Fens were drained in the 17th century. Still susceptible to flooding today, it was these watery surrounds that gave Ely its original name the 'Isle of Eels', a translation of the Anglo Saxon word 'Eilig'.

As with last year's trip, no fish were caught, but the process was fun. This year we tried sweet corn and worms dug up by the club's president Ollie Whitten. Alfie Woolcock has been recently elected as the fishing lead officer, as he displayed far more knowledge on rivers and out-classed the sea fisherman Mason from the Seychelles.

Many thanks to Ursula Juta, the Eel Education Officer, for showing us this mysterious creature, and setting up another fishing session. Our pay-back will be digging some meadows at Bayfield.



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
## MUSIC

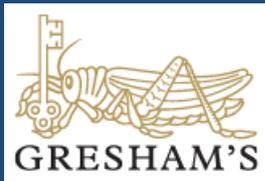




## Oakeley celebrates its 40<sup>th</sup> birthday!


## HOCKEY


## CRICKET

This team is the Norfolk CCC 2<sup>nd</sup> XI and they play fixtures in the East of England League and is a pathway to playing for Norfolk in the Minor Counties Championship. Nat played in the games versus Bedfordshire and Cambridgeshire whilst Charlie and Ben played in the game v Huntingdonshire at Manor Park (Horsford CC). 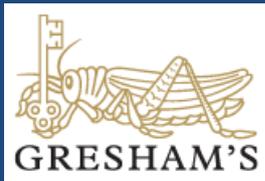


## FOUNDATION

**Myra Mwang'ombe** (O 2009 - 14) released her debut single BE MINE which is now available to purchase, stream and download on ALL major platforms 🎵


