Boarding at Gresham's – an Introduction from the Head of Boarding

As a school, Gresham's has always been committed to ensuring every child within its community is cared for and supported in an environment that fosters trust, independence, personal responsibility, safety and emotional wellbeing; factors that enable a pupil to achieve in all spheres of life.

Recent legislation, The Children Act 2004, supported by boarding School National Minimum Standards and Every Child Matters, sets out a national framework of services, safeguards and entitlements for all children living away from home. It highlights the relationship between educational achievement and well-being.

We hope that boarding at Gresham's will support and ensure the positive outcomes set out in Every Child Matters: that each child is encouraged, nurtured and has the opportunity to:

- Be Healthy
- Stay safe
- Enjoy and Achieve
- Make a positive contribution
- Achieve Economic well-being

Dedicated staff are committed to ensuring each child is regarded as an individual and believe that fostering a successful partnership between parents and school is an essential part in creating a nurturing environment.

Hopefully this short booklet will help to give you an insight into the practices and procedures life in one of our boarding houses and prove useful and reassuring to parents. It will probably not cover all eventualities and should be used in conjunction with 'A guide for new pupils', which your son will be given on arrival, and the section on the school's website entitled 'Pastoral Care', which contains school rules and policies in detail.

Howson's

Howson's is the oldest Boarding House on the school site, and was created to house the whole school when it first moved here from Holt town in 1903. It is named after George William Saul Howson, the then Headmaster and the man credited with starting the development of the school to the size and stature we know it today (see the bust in the common room!) It has had 8 Housemasters since then and is currently home to 77 boys (2019), both day and boarders.

House Ethos

Howson's has a special character. As well as the boys' home during the term, it is a place of work too, and the House prides itself on its friendliness, its honesty, its openness and the support that the older boys give to the younger ones. The staff run the House firmly but fairly. There is great House spirit and your sons will make friends for life in the years they spend here.

“The boys of Howson’s are one of the best bunches of boys I have ever met. Sometimes we may be mocked for our slightly under- average performance at Sports’ Days, but as effort and team spirit go, we win all the races. Residential Staff Roles

There are three members of staff who all live in the boarding House – Howson’s is their permanent home.

The **Housemaster** is Mr Alan Stromberg. He has overall responsibility for the pastoral and academic welfare of every boy in the House.

Mr Stromberg moved to Howson’s in August 2010, and lives here now with his sons Benjamin, Nicholas and Oliver. The Howson’s boys will see more of our black Labrador called Poppy, who is always around the house. Mr Stromberg has been at Gresham’s for twelve years, as a maths teacher and, before Howson’s, as a Visiting Tutor in Farfield. Before teaching, Mr Stromberg was a Sapper, commissioned in the British Army, retiring in the rank of Major. His specialism was in the use of GPS in the military context and he holds Masters degrees in Geodesy and Geographic Information Systems, a B Eng (Hons) in Civil Engineering and a PGCE.

Assistant Housemaster is Mr Solomon Lawes. Mr Lawes is new to teaching and starting his second year; this is his first appointment since leaving Durham University with a PGCE to teach Physics.

Resident Tutor is Mr Darren Latchford, new to Gresham’s this year, but an experienced teacher joining the English department

Non –Residential staff

Mrs Catherine Dennard is our new Day matron. Catherine joins us from Bishop’s Stortford, having worked recently in a boarding environment as an evening tutor, but before that, in theatre and the performing arts. She loves dance, and will no doubt whip the boys into shape for House Music

A team of tutors assist the Residential team to run the house. These are : Mr Steve Adams, Mr Tim Keen, Mr Andrew Coventry, Mr Simon Gates, Mr Sam Curtis, Ms Henrietta Robinson, Mr Justin Myers and Mr James Thomson. All Howson’s staff are academic tutors to small groups of boys as well, in a vertical system which will hopefully secure good continuity of support throughout your boy’s time at Gresham’s.

Accommodation

The House is structurally very sound. It had a major refurbishment nine years ago, with, amongst other improvements, upvc double glazing fitted everywhere – although an old building to look at, it is a warm and comfortable home inside. A redecoration plan commenced in August 2011, with the Day study corridor, wing above and Common Rooms being painted. Painting was completed in Easter 2012 and there is now a smart cream and red colour scheme through the whole building. Much of the dorm furniture was replaced in 2016 and 2017 as well, providing cabin beds for the majority of boys.

Finally, there was a long-awaited upgrade to colonnade in summer 2019, with the whole corridor redesigned and now incorporating an office for our new day matron.

Study bedrooms. All boarders have study space in their rooms. 3rd and 4th Formers (years 9 and 10) normally share with one or two other boys (and change rooms and room-mates every term), but 5th and 6th Formers (years 11-13) have their own study-bedrooms throughout the House. 3rd Formers will do their prep in the Common Room under the supervision of the duty staff member and Housemaster until they show they are good independent learners, when they can go to their rooms to study.

Day boy studies. All day boys have their own study along the day boy corridor.

Recreation rooms. The Common Room is the main House communal area. It has snooker, networked computers, Sky television (at certain times of the day), newspapers and a library. There is a kitchen, stocked daily with bread, milk and drinks, cereals and spreads, to supplement main meals, and the 6th Form have their own living rooms and kitchenettes in two attic spaces.

Visitors

Visitors are of course most welcome to Howson's. Parents are asked to make themselves known to House staff on arrival, and should avoid walking around the bedroom corridors unless accompanied by their sons. Other pupils, and especially girls, are restricted to the communal areas of the House.

Daily Routine

This is the broad week-day routine:

Monday and Friday evenings are curfew nights where the boys spend the evening in House.

Bed Times

The duty member of staff, with the help of both the duty prefect and matron, will supervise bed times as follows:

Telephone calls between boys and parents after these times can be disruptive, and House staff are quick to clamp down on boys who might be texting their friends after lights out. An ideal time to make contact with your son during the school day is from 1.30 to 2.15 pm (Mon / Wed / Fri), after games (Tue / Thur /

Sat) or in the evenings from 8.30 pm to 9.15 pm. If your son doesn't have his own mobile, you are most welcome to call him via my Study.

Medical

Thank you for completing the Medical questionnaires in your welcome packs. For routine appointments with a Doctor at our Medical Centre, boys see Matron between 7.45 and 8.00 am for a chit – all but the mildest complaints are sent to the 'san'. Matron is the focus for all medical issues in the House. We don't generally inform parents concerning these mild illnesses; normally only if an overnight stay is required.

Please hand medication from home to Matron, clearly labelled as such. Self-medication (with items such as asthma inhalers) is of course possible; we ask you to complete a self-medication form, as we must know who is self-medicating. There is an Emergency First Aid box in the house, with asthma inhalers and epipens, if urgent action is required. All boys are shown this on arrival.

Boys who feel unwell during the day will be told to return to the house to see Matron, or to report directly to the SAN from lessons. On no account should they put themselves directly to bed in house.

Boys are excused games if they have an off-games chit signed by the Housemaster or Matron. If boys need to be taken out of school for medical or dental appointments, parents are asked to liaise with the HSM or Matron in the usual way. Matron is a regular attender with boys at Cromer Minor Injuries Unit and at the Norfolk and Norwich hospital; parents can be assured of a speedy and compassionate approach by House staff to any medical issues.

Arrival and Collection times

Day boys are asked to arrive in House by 8.00 am every day of the week. Roll call starts at 8.05 am.

Collection times can vary. Please let the HSM know at what time you would like to collect your son.

Games Afternoons / travel with friends. You are of course most welcome indeed at any matches, home and away, and there is always some form of match tea afterwards, normally in the new school pavilion. Boys can go home directly from away matches if their parents come to watch, or go home for the weekend with the parents of another boy. The school naturally has strict rules in place about boys travelling in other peoples' cars. In essence, permission in writing or by email will seal the deal happily.

Absences

Please try to give notice in writing (email) if your son has an appointment which will take him away from school. Please phone the House in the morning, too, if you think your son will be late for roll call or will miss the day. Boys late for first roll call have to report in to reception on arrival. Holiday times are published well in advance, and requests for your son to leave early or return late are discouraged, but should be made directly to the Headmaster please.

Academic Guidance in the House

Howson's is not just the boys' home away from home, but also where much of their schoolwork is completed. Their dorms and bedsits are designed in such a way as to promote good learning, and there is a strong ethos of understanding and empathy between the boys about the need to work, and the quiet and privacy at times to do so, especially around exam times in January and June. The academic tutor system at school is designed so that your son's personal tutor will get to know him not only during tutor periods but in the house in the evenings too. Tutors will monitor your son's progress throughout the year, and will report on him alongside the other teachers. If you have any questions about your son's progress, then the tutor is your first port of call. I hope that your son's tutor will make contact with you within the first few weeks of term. You can easily contact the tutor by email, using the school-wide system of first initial then surname, for example : astromberg@greshams.com

You will be sent regular school orders' cards and reports on your son's progress at school, and of course I am always here to discuss academic matters with you as they arise. There are regular Parent / Teacher meetings scheduled in the school calendar.

"If you are boarding, then make sure you are organised and keep you room tidy. Bring some money in case you need something in emergency. Always respect prefects; they have the authority to punish you ! Keep on top of your work by doing your prep every night and keep your folders organised. If you fail to do prep or are late for lessons, be honest and accept the punishment." Daniel Roofe

Safety and Security (personal, money, documents , electrical items, etc)

There is much detail in the Pastoral Care booklet (to be found in the Parent Portal) about the security of personal possessions, labelling of clothing and equipment etc, that does not need repeating here, save to say that Howson's has an very good record for safety of boys' belongings. Each boarder, however, must have a lockable tuck box or equivalent to keep his valuables in. A cheap and easy solution is a plastic mini tool box from a DIY centre. I suggest a combination lock not a key / padlock. I am very happy to look after, in my study, any items of value for your sons, and would expect to have all of their passports and money over £50. The Assistant HSM is happy to run a house bank / pocket money system for those boys who prefer to have access to cash or do not have a bank account or debit card. The boys are impressed upon to keep their rooms tidy, the first step in ensuring they know where their stuff is and that it is safe.

The boys do not need alot of spending money while at school. Apart from the occasional trip into town and the school tuck shop – Dave's Diner – there is not much to spend money on, and too much money can cause problems amongst groups, but of course this is entirely up to you. I can always give the boys money and it be charged to the parents' fee account. This is a common way to arrange weekly pocket money.

Clothing & Equipment

When the boys are in school uniform, I will expect them to be clean and smart at all times, especially in their shoes. The boys do not need a huge wardrobe of home clothes, they do not get a great deal of wear. Obviously, a boy's general appearance is very much a working partnership between parents and

school. Detailed guidance is again given in the Pastoral Care booklet, but I hope you will find me supportive of any 'dress' rules you insist upon with your sons at home .

Matron has a store of spare clothing – uniform, sports stuff and so on – if any boy, day or boarder, happens to be in need of something, and she can arrange with the school shop for new clothing to be bought. Please remember to label everything ! This is especially important of home clothes if they are to go in the school laundry system

In addition to the kit list that the school has provided you, I would recommend that the boys also bring with them, for their studies, a hole-punch, a bed-side light and perhaps a multi-socket electrical adaptor, especially if they are bringing both a laptop and a 'phone.

House and Parent Partnership

Especially for boys new to the school, the first few days and weeks of the new school year can be daunting at times. It is the primary role of the house staff to look after the boys well and to help them settle in as quickly and happily as possible. Key to this of course is communication between house staff and parents, and I hope that you will feel you can contact me by any means you wish, whenever you like. I will generally be in my study and locking up the House until 11.30 pm most evenings, so please do not feel unsure about calling late into the evening if something is bothering you ! Matron is equally happy to take your calls – please use us ! My phone receives email too, so please use my mobile number in the first instance : 07900 605801

I hope that this booklet has given you a flavour of life in Howson’s. You are more than welcome to visit the House and your boys; please come in to see a member of staff, especially if you collect daily, rather than sitting in the car.
